## **Early Language Strategies**

Get face to face and watch to see what your child is interested in to encourage interaction

**Observe, Wait, Listen** (first turn, more turns, enjoyable turns):

- **Observe** how your child reacts or sends messages, and what they are interested in.
- Wait up to 5 seconds to give your child a chance to start the interaction by saying or doing something.
- Listen for anything your child might say.
- **Create opportunities for your child to lead.** Set up the Situation by:
  - Show then wait- show your child a desired object and wait for them to request
  - Creative stupidity- forget to do something or give your child a necessary object and wait for them to respond (e.g. forget to give your child a spoon for cereal)
  - Bit by bit-give small portions of a snack, keep the pieces of a toy and wait for your child to request more
  - Hard to operate-give your child items that you know they will need your help with (e.g. wind-up toys, a plastic container with a toy inside)

## Follow your child's lead by:

- o joining in the play and using objects/activities that will motivate them
- imitating what the child says and does. You can play a copy cat game. Use a mirror so your child can see their face and yours. Imitate sounds/facial expressions that your child makes. Slowly introduce new sounds/facial expressions so your child will copy you. Start with any sounds your child can already make such as: \_\_\_\_\_\_. Then add new fun sounds such as: oh-oh, mmmm, boo, wow, beep-beep etc. Also try new animal sounds and fun words.
- **interpreting** your child's gestures/pointing and give them the word(s) they would say-"Say it like he would if he could!!"
- using **COMMENTS** instead of questions! Comments increase opportunities for your child to imitate

	Match your turns to your child's turns. Keep your turns short and focus on what your child is interested in.
	Cue your child's turn: wait expectantly give a visual helper, like a gesture and wait ask a questionand wait. Try not to ask too many questions or questions that are conversation stoppers.
	Use questions and comments to continue the conversation: ask questions related to your child's topic of interest ask questions the child can answer balance questions with comments
	<b>Use appropriate language models:</b> Talk about what is happening at that moment Avoid non-specific words (e.g. this, that). Increase vocabulary by talking during everyday routines (e.g. bath time, cooking dinner, doing laundry, getting dressed etc.). Focus on a variety of simple key words such as actions (eat, drink, sleep), and location words (up, on, in).
	Expand by listening to what your child says, repeat it and add just one word
	<b>Highlight language</b> by talking slowly, and using gestures. Be animated! Be enthusiastic and entertaining by using lots of facial expressions and using increased intonation in your voice. Make communication fun!
	<b>Repeat! Repeat!</b> Children need to hear a word at least <u>20 times</u> in context before they may try it.
	<b>Build your child's understanding</b> of the world by using comments and questions to talk about the past, or future, explain things, talk about feelings, talk about pretending/imagining, and to describe, compare and contrast things.
